VII. SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

PHS ACADEMIES OFFER FOCUSED CURRICULA FOR SPECIFIC COLLEGE AND CAREER PATHS

At both school assemblies and the PHS Experience, eighth grade students and parents were introduced to an exciting new program at Piscataway High School. Offered for the first time in the 2018-2019 school year, PHS Academies will give students a structured pathway of courses in preparation for post-secondary college and career opportunities. These "schools within a school" emphasize specialized content areas while simultaneously offering the depth and breadth of a large high school experience. Students at PHS Academies participate in all PHS athletics, arts, clubs, and activities. In September, academies will be offered in Engineering, Biomedical Studies, Performing Arts, and Visual Arts. Admission is competitive with selection based on grades, test scores, teacher recommendations, and prior elective choices. A night devoted to an indepth introduction to the Academies will be held on Wednesday, January 31, at which time applications will be available. Applications close on March 1 with portfolio reviews, auditions, and assessments taking place during March. Students accepted into the academies will be notified on or before April 10, 2018.

FBLA STUDENTS SCORE IN TITAN'S COMPETITION

This past fall, 73 PHS FBLA and DECA students, on 29 teams, competed virtually with hundreds of other students from around New Jersey in Junior Achievement's Titan competition. JA Titan introduces critical economics and management decisions through an interactive simulation. Of this group, 43 students on 18 teams qualified to move on to the semifinal round, held at various corporate locations around New Jersey throughout January. With three of four semifinal rounds complete, 17 PHS students on six teams are still in the hunt for the final round, which will be held at Ethicon (J&J) in Somerville, NJ, on February 5. "Junior Achievement Titan is a unique experience that gives students the thrill of running their own business while competing against other industries," states Adam Liang, PHS senior and veteran of previous Titan competitions. Adam hopes to avenge last year's second-place finish (which earned his team a not-so-shabby \$500) and seize the championship this year (and its \$1000 prize).

CONACKAMACK STUDENTS WORK TOGETHER TO WIN

At Conackamack, Ms. Lisk's class visited Mr. Rollis's 8th grade class for a WINNING presentation. The students shared their study of the energy transfer in food webs. The two classes regularly work together on academic and social skills, and the students look forward to sharing time with one another. This entire lesson was put together by 8th grade Conackamack student Joseph Wojtowicz.
